



Bill Briney, a Founding Father of Friends of Bitter Lake



Bill Briney, who was instrumental in working to create the Friends group at Bitter Lake, passed away this summer. Services were held on June 21, 2025 at 10:00 a.m., at Westminster Presbyterian in Roswell. Bill was very active in working with the founding members of the Friends. His interest in environmental issues led him to spend

numerous hours working with the biologists at the refuge. He served as president and worked on organizing the interior of the Visitor's Center as it was being constructed. He is also the founding father of the Nature Store and was

able to help establish that as an important part of the refuge. There will be a donation box at the Friends' table during the Dragonfly Festival to raise money for a memorial to permanently remember all the contributions that Bill made to Bitter Lake.

Refuge Miscellany

- Due to short staffing the Youth Hunt will not be held this fall on the refuge. Hunters will be able to hunt on the north tract, off the refuge, but not on the south tract. Hunting of waterfowl will be allowed in the hunt area of the middle tract.
- The refuge has received welcome rain this year. Due to flooding, there
 was some damage on the South Track where the Rio Hondo enters the
 refuge. A cultural resources archaeologist is in the office looking at
 research on the levies to be repaired before the actual flood damage can
 be completed.
- Biologists at the Refuge are conducting a ribbon snake survey, barking frog survey, and fish biologists are going to visit to do genetics and studies on Pecos gambusia in the sinkholes.
- The refuge is going to be welcoming interns who will be studying and working with invasive species
- Road closures from recent flooding have hurt daily visitation
- The Oxbow Trail repairs will hopefully be completed within 2 more months
